






Three Apples Fell from the Sky / Narine Abgaryan (2020)



Their only connection to the outside world is an ancient telegraph wire and a perilous mountain road that even goats struggle to navigate. As they go about their daily lives - harvesting crops, making baklava, tidying houses - the villagers sustain one another through good times and bad. But sometimes all it takes is a spark of romance to turn life on its head, and a plot to bring two of Maran's most stubbornly single residents together soon gives the village something new to gossip about.


The Reading List / Sara Nisha Adams (2021)


A Bookshop in Algiers / Kaouther Adimi (2017)

Interweaving Charlot's story with that of another twenty-year-old, Ryad, who is dispatched to the old shop in 2017 to empty it of books and repaint it. Ryad's no booklover, but old Abdallah, the bookshop's self-appointed, nearly illiterate guardian, opens the young man's mind. *Fiction*




Locust Summer / David Allan-Petale (2021)

On the cusp of summer, 1986, Rowan Brockman's mother asks if he will come home to Septimus in the Western Australian Wheatbelt to help with the final harvest. Rowan's brother, the natural heir to the farm, has died, and Rowan's dad's health is failing. Although he longs to, there is no way that Rowan can refuse his mother's request as she prepares the farm for sale. This is the story of the final harvest - the story of one young man in a place he doesn't want to be, being given one last chance to make peace before the past, and those he has loved, disappear. *Fiction - Australian author*



A Long Petal of the Sea / Isabel Allende (2020)

In the late 1930s, civil war grips Spain. A pregnant young widow, finds her life intertwined with that of an army doctor, the brother of her deceased love. When opportunity to seek refuge in Chile arises, they take it, boarding a ship chartered by the poet Pablo Neruda to the promised "long petal of sea and wine and snow". There, they find themselves enmeshed in a rich web of characters who come together in love and tragedy over the course of four generations, destined to witness the battle between freedom and repression as it plays out across the world. *Fiction*




The Elephant Whisperer / Lawrence Anthony (2009)

Lawrence Anthony accepted a herd of "rogue" wild elephants on his Thula Thula game reserve in Zululand in order to save their lives. In the years that followed he became a part of their family. And as he battled to create a bond with the elephants, he came to realize that they had a great deal to teach him about life, loyalty, and freedom. *True Story*

What are you looking for? So asks Tokyo's most enigmatic librarian. For Sayuri Komachi is able to sense exactly what each visitor to her library is searching for and provide just the book recommendation to help them find it. The Truth and Other Lies / Sascha Arango (2015)



If only the readers and critics who worship his every word knew that his success depends on a carefully maintained lie. His luck must surely run out, and he simply can't allow that to happen. Henry makes a fatal error that could cause the whole dream to unravel and, despite his Machiavellian efforts, events swiftly spin out of control as lie is heaped upon lie, menace upon menace. *Fiction*



The Rain Heron / Robbie Arnott (2020)

Set in a slightly futuristic world where climate change has impacted severely on the land and its people. Ren lives alone on the remote frontier of a country devastated by a coup. High on the forested slopes, she survives by hunting and trading - and forgetting. But when a young soldier comes to the mountains in search of a legendary creature, Ren is inexorably drawn into an impossible mission. As their lives entwine, unravel and erupt - as myth merges with reality - both Ren and the soldier are forced to confront what they regret, what they love, and what they fear.



In 2014 Emma was spiralling into a deep depression, driven by anguish about her gender. She quit the radio, travelled, and decided on a surprising path - teaching music in a war zone. Through the chaos of Kabul, into the lives of the Afghan children who are transported by music. Alongside these epic experiences, Emma determines to take the final steps to secure her own peace; she becomes the man always there inside - Eddie.


Days without End / Sebastian Barry (2017)

Thomas McNulty, aged barely seventeen and having fled the Great Famine in Ireland, signs up for the U.S. Army in the 1850s. With his brother in arms, John Cole, Thomas goes on to fight in the Indian Wars—against the Sioux and the Yurok—and, ultimately, the Civil War. Orphans of terrible hardships themselves, the men find these days to be vivid and alive, despite the horrors they see and are complicit in. A fresh and haunting portrait of the most fateful years in American history and is a novel never to be forgotten. *Fiction*



Sunbathing / Isobel Beech (2022)

After weeks of grieving, a woman books a plane ticket, bound for an old villa in the mountains of Abruzzo. Invited to stay with her friends Giulia and Fab-she lives for a summer in the house's Birthing Room, where generations of women once had their babies. More often, she lives in her head: in the past, trying to make sense of her grief and wondering how to go on, or if she can. She passes the time helping with the household chores, walking in the sunshine and plucking fruit from the nearby orchards, all while dwelling on the moments with her father that might have warned her something was wrong.



After Story / Larissa Behrendt (2021)

When Indigenous lawyer Jasmine decides to take her mother Della on a tour of England's most revered literary sites, Jasmine hopes it will bring them closer together and help them reconcile the past. Twenty-five years earlier the disappearance of Jasmine's older sister devastated their tightknit community. This tragedy returns to haunt Jasmine and Della when another child mysteriously goes missing on Hampstead Heath. As Jasmine immerses herself in the world of her literary idols, Della is inspired to rediscover the wisdom of her own culture and storytelling. But sometimes the stories that are not told can become too great to bear.



Welcome to Nowhere River / Meg Bignell (2021)




The Blue / Nancy Bilyeau (2018)

When Genevieve meets the charming Sir Courtenay, he offers her an opportunity she can't refuse; if she learns the secrets of porcelain, he will send her to Venice. The Silence of Water / Sharron Booth (2022)

It's the turn of the century when Fan's mother, Agnes, announces the family is moving to Western Australia to take care of Agnes's father – a man they've never spoken of before now. Resentful of her mother's decision to move, Fan forms an alliance with her grandfather, Edwin Salt, a convict transported to Australia in 1861. As she listens to memories of his former life in England, Fan starts snooping around the house, riffling through Edwin's belongings in an attempt to fill the gaps in his stories. But the secrets Fan uncovers will test the family's fragile bonds forever, and force Edwin into a final reckoning with the brutality of his past.



Ghost Species / James Bradley (2020)

Scientist Kate joins a secretive project to re-engineer the climate by resurrecting extinct species, including the Neanderthals. But when the first of the children is born, Kate is torn between science and wanting to protect little Eve. As Eve grows to adulthood she and Kate must face the question of who and what she is. Is Eve natural or artificial? Human or non-human? Set against the backdrop of hastening climate catastrophe, Ghost Species is an exquisitely beautiful and deeply affecting exploration of connection and loss in an age of planetary trauma.

The Collected Regrets of Clover / Mikki Brammer (2023)

What's the point of giving someone a beautiful death if you can't give yourself a beautiful life? After the beloved grandfather who raised her dies alone while she is traveling, Clover becomes a death doula in New York City, dedicating her life to ushering people peacefully through their end-of-life process. Clover spends so much time with the dying that she has no life of her own, until the final wishes of a feisty old woman send Clover on a trip across the country to uncover a forgotten love story--and perhaps, her own happy ending.



Wearing Paper Dresses / Anne Brinsden (2019)



She struggles: Bill works all day in the paddock and her father-in-law is openly hostile to her. She tries to become part of the community but is thought strange. As their mother withdraws more into herself, her spirited daughters, are left to raise themselves as best they can. A saga of two generations of women on the land.

Caleb's Crossing / Geraldine Brooks (2011)


The book is inspired by the life of Caleb Cheeshahteaumauk, in 1665, Caleb became the first American Indian to graduate from Harvard. It is about Caleb's journey from the Island to Harvard but it is also Bethia Mayfield's story. Bethia is a young Puritan girl, who becomes Caleb's lifelong friend, who also longs for an education but is denied. The intersection of two people from different cultures and ideas, and the love they share for each other and their home. A luminous yet harsh tale of love and faith, pain, and magic. *Fiction - Australian author*



The Islands / Emily Brugman (2022)

In the mid-1950s, a small group of Finnish migrants set up camp on Little Rat, a tiny island in an archipelago off the coast of Western Australia. The Islands is the sweeping story of the Saari family: Onni, an industrious and ambitious young man, grappling with the loss of a loved one; his wife Alva, quiet but stoic, seeking a sense of belonging; and their pensive daughter Hilda, who dreams of becoming the skipper of her own boat. As the Saari's try to build their future in Australia, their lives entwine with those of the fishing families of Little Rat, in myriad and unexpected ways.



Edward Street Baby Farm / Stella Budrikis (2020)

In 1907, Perth woman Alice Mitchell was arrested for the murder of five-month-old Ethel Booth. During the inquest and subsequent trial, the state was horrified to learn that at least 37 infants had died in Mitchell's care in the previous six years. It became clear that she had been running a 'baby farm', making a profit out of caring for the children of single mothers and other 'unfortunate women'. The trial gripped the city of Perth and the nation. This book retraces this infamous 'baby farm' tragedy, which led to legislative changes to protect children's welfare.

A Stolen Life: The Bruce Trevorrow Case / Antonio Buti (2019)

On Christmas Day 1957, Joe Trevorrow walked through the blistering South Australian heat to seek help for his sick baby boy. When relatives agreed to take Bruce to hospital, Joe was relieved - his son was in safe hands - but, within days, Bruce would be living with another family, and Joe would never see his son again. This traces his journey and the legal team who believed in him, the judge who empathised with his plight, and the court case that made him the only member of the Stolen Generations to take on the state and win.



The Girl Who Fell From the Sky / Emma Carey (2022)

When Emma Carey was twenty, she fell from 14,000 feet and survived. Emma tells us the inspirational story of how, through what could be considered one of her greatest tragedies, she found her truest self. From waking in hospital to the news that she was a paraplegic to learning how to use her legs again, through the six-year long court case and now being finally free to make the most of her life, Emma teaches us the importance of courage and resilience and how to appreciate the extraordinary beauty found even in the most ordinary moments of our lives.

A Long Way from Home / Peter Carey (2017)

Irene Bobs loves fast driving. Her husband is the best car salesman in western Victoria. Together they enter the Redex Trial, a brutal race around the ancient continent over roads no car will ever quite survive. With them is their navigator, Willie Bachhuber, a quiz show champion and failed schoolteacher whose job it is to call out the turns, the grids, the creek crossings on a map that will finally remove them, without warning, from the lily-white Australia they know so well.

Chai Time at Cinnamon Gardens / Shankari Chandran (2022)

Cinnamon Gardens Nursing Home is nestled in the quiet suburb of Westgrove, Sydney – populated with residents with colourful histories, each with their own secrets, triumphs and failings. But this ordinary neighbourhood is not without its prejudices. The serenity of Cinnamon Gardens is threatened by malignant forces more interested in what makes this refuge different rather than embracing the calm companionship that makes this place home to so many. Chai Time at Cinnamon Gardens is about family and memory, community and race, but is ultimately a love letter to storytelling and how our stories shape who we are.





Saving Mona Lisa / Gerri Chanel (2018)


In 1939, curators at the Louvre spirited away the world's most famous painting into to the Loire Valley. So began the biggest evacuation of art and antiquities in history. As the Germans neared Paris in 1940, the French raced to move the masterpieces still further south, then again and again during the war, crisscrossing the southwest of France. Throughout the German occupation, the museum staff fought to keep the priceless treasures out of the hands of Hitler and his henchmen, often risking their lives to protect the country's artistic heritage.


The Night Tiger / Yangsze Choo (2019)

Ji Lin is stuck as an apprentice dressmaker, moonlighting as a dancehall girl to help pay off her mother's Mahjong debts. When one of her dance partners leaves behind a gruesome souvenir, Ji Lin may finally get the adventure she has been longing for. Houseboy Ren is also on a mission, racing to fulfil his former master's dying wish: to find the man's finger, lost years ago in an accident, and bury it with his body. Ren has 49 days to do so, or his master's soul will wander the earth forever. *Fiction*




The Tenth Muse / Catherine Chung (2019)

From childhood, Katherine knows she is different, and that her parents are not who they seem to be. But in becoming a mathematician and on her quest to conquer the greatest unsolved mathematical problem of her time, she turns to a theorem with a mysterious history that holds the lock and key to her identity. Forced to confront some of the most consequential events of the 20th century and rethink everything she knows of herself, she strives to take her place in the world of higher mathematics and finds kinship in the stories of the women who came before her. *Fiction*



Little Bee / Chris Cleve (2010)

The publishers don't want to tell you too much about this book. It is a truly special story and they don't want to spoil it. Nevertheless, you need to know something, so they will just say this: This is the story of two women. Their lives collide one fateful day, and one of them has to make a terrible choice, the kind of choice we hope you never have to face. Two years later, they meet again - the story starts there. *Fiction*




The Tolstoy Estate / Steven Conte (2020)

During the German invasion of Russia in WWII, a German doctor, Bauer, is assigned to establish a field hospital at the former estate of Count Leo Tolstoy. There he encounters a hostile aristocratic Russian woman, who has been left in charge. But as a friendship develops between them, Bauer's arrogant commanding officer, becomes unhinged as the war turns against the Germans. Soon, everything starts to unravel... Exploring themes of sacrifice, love, desire, betrayal, duty and the power of great literature to inspire thought, to change minds and to connect people. *Fiction - Australian author*



The Butterfly Collector / Téa Cooper (2022)

What connects a botanical illustration of a butterfly with a missing baby and an enigma fifty years in the making? 1868 Morpeth Theodora cannot believe her luck when she discovers a butterfly never before sighted in Australia. With the help of her maid, Clarrie, she is poised to make a natural science discovery. The Clarrie's newborn son goes missing and everything changes. 1922 Sydney Verity loses her job at The Arrow, and attends a ball where she lands a juicy commission to write the history of the Treadwell Foundation – an institution that supports disgraced young women and their babies. As she investigates, she is lead to a dark and complex mystery, fifty years in the making. Can she solve it? And would anyone believe her if she does?



Fossil Hunter / Téa Cooper (2021)

A fossil discovered at London's Natural History Museum leads one woman back in time to nineteenth century Australia and a world of scientific discovery and dark secrets in this compelling historical mystery. *The Hunter Valley 1847.* Mellie's benefactors send her to visit a family friend, Anthea Winstanley. Anthea is an amateur palaeontologist with a dream. She is convinced she will one day find proof the great sea dragons swam in the vast inland sea that millions of years ago covered her property at Bow Wow Gorge. Soon, Mellie shares that dream for she loves fossil hunting too... *Fiction - Australian author*



The Ship that Never Was / Adam Courtenay (2018)

In 1823, James Porter was convicted of stealing and transported to Van Diemen's Land. After several escape attempts from the notorious penal colony, Porter was sent to Sarah Island, known as hell on earth. Many had tried to escape; few had succeeded. When the Governor announced that the place would be closed and its prisoners moved to Port Arthur, Porter, along with a motley crew of other prisoners, pulled off an audacious escape. What happened next is stranger than fiction, a fitting outcome for this true-life picaresque tale.

Kathleen O'Connor of Paris / Amanda Curtin (2018)


In 1906, Kathleen O'Connor left Perth, where her famous father's life had ended in tragedy. She had her sights set on a career in bohemian Paris. More than a century later, Amanda Curtin faces her own questions, of life and of art, as she embarks on a journey in Kate's footsteps. Part biography, part travel narrative, this is the story of an artist who, with limited resources and despite the impacts of war and loss, worked and exhibited in Paris for over forty years. Her figure paintings, portraits and still life's, still highly prized today, form an inseparable part of the telling.


The Sinkings / Amanda Curtin (2008)

In 1882, human remains were discovered at a lonely campsite called the Sinkings near Albany. The autopsy claimed the remains were those of a woman. Why, then, was the victim identified as Little Jock, a sandalwood-cutter and former convict? Why was the murder so brutal, so gruesome? More than a hundred years later, Willa Samson embarks on a search to find out why. A recluse, Willa is drawn back into the world as she researches, communicates with family historians, and journeys to the UK, looking for clues to her questions.



Boy Swallows Universe / Trent Dalton (2018)


A mute brother, a junkie mum, a heroin dealer for a stepfather and a notorious crime for a babysitter. It's not as if Eli Bell's life isn't complicated enough already. He's just trying to follow his heart, but fate keeps throwing obstacles in his way - not the least of which is Tytus Broz, legendary Brisbane drug dealer. But now life is going to get a whole lot more serious: he's about to meet the father he doesn't remember, break into jail on Christmas Day to rescue his mum, come face to face with the criminals who tore his world apart, and fall in love.



The Girl with the Louding Voice / Abi Dare (2020)

Adunni is a 14 year old Nigerian girl who knows she wants an education. But instead, her father sells her to be the third wife of a local man who is eager for her to bear him a son. Adunni runs away to the city, hoping to make a better life, but finds the only other option before her is servitude to a wealthy family. But Adunni has dreams! She wants to go to school, become educated, and eventually teach. Daré's debut novel follows Adunni's journey towards achieving this lofty goal. Along the way, this delightful, spirited girl will steal your heart.





Happiness / Aminatta Forna (2018)


Attila, a Ghanaian psychiatrist and Jean, an American studying the habits of urban foxes meet. From this chance encounter, numerous connections interweave, bringing lives together. Attila is in London to deliver a speech on trauma and to check up on the daughter of friends, who hasn't called home in a while. It emerges that she has been swept up in an immigration crackdown and now her son is missing. A tale of love and loss, of cruelty and kindness, exploring the connections with all living creatures, and the true nature of happiness.






Lenny's Book of Everything / Karen Foxlee (2018)

Lenny, small and sharp, has a younger brother Davey who won't stop growing - and at seven is as tall as a man. Raised by their mother, they have food and a roof over their heads, but not much else. The bright spot every week is the arrival of the latest issue of *Burrell's Build-it-at-Home Encyclopedia*. Through the encyclopedia, they experience the wonders of the world - and dream about a life of freedom and adventure. A book about finding good in the bad that will break your heart while raising your spirits in the way that only a classic novel can.




The Promise / Damon Galgut (2021)

A taut and menacing novel that charts the crash and burn of an Afrikaans family, the Swarts. Punctuated by funerals that bring the ever-diminishing family together, each of the four parts opens with a death and a new decade. The characterisations are razor sharp, the dialogue dramatic, the action gripping. As we traverse the decades, Damon interweaves the story of a disappointed nation from apartheid to Jacob Zuma. *Fiction*



Lessons in Chemistry / Bonnie Garmus (2022)

Chemist Elizabeth Zott is not your average woman. In fact, Elizabeth Zott would be the first to point out that there is no such thing. But it's the early 1960s and her all-male team at Hastings Research Institute take a very unscientific view of equality. Except for one: Calvin Evans; the lonely, brilliant, Nobel-prize nominated grudge-holder who falls in love with - of all things - her mind. True chemistry results. But like science, life is unpredictable. Which is why a few years later, Elizabeth Zott finds herself not only a single mother, but the reluctant star of America's most beloved cooking show Supper at Six. *Fiction*




Secrets of the Sea House / Elisabeth Gifford (2013)

Scotland, 1860. Reverend Ferguson, takes up his new parish, an isolated patch on a Hebridean island. His time on the island will irrevocably change his life, but the house on the edge of the dunes keeps its silence long after he departs. Ruth and Michael buy the grand but dilapidated building a century later. Their dreams of turing it into a home are marred by the discovery of tiny bones buried beneath the house; the child's fragile legs are fused together -a mermaid child. Who buried the bones? Ruth finds the answers to her questions may lie in her own past. *Fiction*



Secrets my Father Kept / Rachel Givney (2021)

Secrets My Father Kept is a captivating novel about love, sacrifice, secrets and resilience, as the clock inexorably ticks down to a devastating world war. It's April 1939. As the Fuhrer edges towards an invasion of Poland, total war looms in Europe. However in Krakow, seventeen-year-old Marie Karska's primary concern is the unexplained disappearance of her mother fifteen years ago, and her father Dominik's unbreakable silence on the matter.



Olga Dies Dreaming / Xochitl Gonzalez (2022)

It's 2017, and Olga and her brother, Pedro, are bold-faced names in their hometown of New York. Prieto is a popular congressman, while Olga is the wedding planner for Manhattan's power brokers. Despite their alluring public lives, behind closed doors things are far less rosy. Olga meets Matteo, who forces her to confront the effects of long-held family secrets. Twenty-seven years ago, their mother, Blanca, abandoned her children to advance a militant political cause. Now, Blanca has come barreling back into their lives.

JJ spies what she believes is a priceless Van Gogh. Except it can't be ... that painting, Six Sunflowers, was destroyed during World War II. 

The Inaugural Meeting of the Fairvale Ladies Book Club / Sophie Green (2017)




How to Stop Time / Matt Haig (2017)




The Foundling / Stacey Halls (2020)


Lovebirds / Amanda Hampson (2021)

The Drowning Woman / Robyn Harding (2023)



The Secret Life of Shirley Sullivan / Lisa Ireland (2020)




The Tea Ladies of St Jude's Hospital / Joanna Nell (2021)




1984 / George Orwell (1949)


Where the Crawdads Sing / Delia Owens (2018)






The Dutch House / Ann Patchett (2019)


The Curious Charms of Arthur Pepper / Phaedra Patrick (2016)


The Fatal Dance / Berndt Sellheim (2021)
