Purpose

The purpose of this resource is to provide Shire of Mundaring residents with information regarding the issue of homelessness as it exists in a local and national context. In addition, this document will also provide a local directory for those at risk of or currently experiencing homelessness.

Understanding Homelessness

The Australian Bureau of Statistics (ABS) ⁽¹⁾ defines homelessness as: When a person does not have suitable accommodation alternatives, they are considered homeless if their current living arrangement:

Is a dwelling that is inadequate; or

Has no tenure, or if their initial tenure is short and not extendable; or

Does not allow them to have control of, and access to space for social relations.

According to the AIHW (2), the three tiers of homelessness are:

Primary Homelessness

People without conventional accommodation (living on the streets, in deserted buildings, improvised dwellings, under bridges, in parks etc.)

Secondary Homelessness

People moving between various forms of temporary shelter including friends' houses, emergency accommodation, youth refuges, hostels and boarding houses.

Tertiary Homelessness

People living in single rooms in private boarding houses without their own bathroom, kitchen or security of tenure.

Homelessness data is measured through statistics collected by the ABS and/or organisations who support those at risk or experiencing homelessness.

The 2021 ABS Census ⁽³⁾ reported that on any given night in Australia, there will be 122,494 people experiencing homelessness.

- 23 per cent of which were below 25 years old
- One in five identified as Aboriginal and/or Torres Strait Islander
- Only 6.2 per cent were those considered to be in the 'primary' category, the vast majority were within the other two tiers

It is important to recognise that Census data is not always able to capture the full demographics of homelessness, for example, individuals facing family and domestic violence may be unable to accurately complete the census as it may pose a risk to their safety.

Over 2021 – 2022, the AIHW ⁽²⁾ reported that 272,700 people were supported by homelessness support services. A further 105,000 people who attempted to access support were unable to receive help due to staff shortages, accommodation or other factors. This roughly equates to 300 individuals being denied support each day.

It is known that the causes of homelessness are incredibly varied for each person experiencing homelessness. The Department of Communities published its Homelessness in Western Australia: A Review of the research and statistical evidence report ⁽⁴⁾, which outlined the common causes present in people experiencing homelessnes. These include but are not limited to:

- Trauma and Post Traumatic Stress Disorder (PTSD)
- Mental health issues
- Substance use problems
- Domestic and family violence
- Interactions with the justice system

It widely noted that trauma, substance use, and physical and mental illness often occur before, during and after periods of homelessness for individuals. Homelessness Australia's 2023 report ⁽⁵⁾ stated the following as reasons for individuals accessing support:

- 52 per cent of people had issues with housing/finances
- 28 per cent reported domestic violence
- 20 per cent reported a breakdown of a relationship or other issues

Homelessness at a Local Level

Shire of Mundaring is a local government authority spanning 644 kmsq from Midvale to Malmalling. With a population of 40,498 ⁽⁶⁾ it is fair to suggest that the amount of people experiencing homelessness is relatively small compared to other local government areas. According to the 2021 Census ⁽³⁾, the reported number of people within the shire experiencing homelessness was 77 individuals. The most common living arrangements for these 77 people was people living in crowded dwellings, temporarily staying with other households and people in supported accommodation for the homeless.

People experiencing homelessness in the shire have the same rights as other residents including:

- Use of public spaces/facilities/services
- Opportunity to participate in community events and activities
- Opportunity to carry and store personal belongings
