4. Tom Burbidge – Mundaring Resident & Ratepayer Association

1. Will the Shire of Mundaring ask WALGA to gather interested LGA's and other parties to lobby the Federal Government for reliable mobile phone and home phone coverage during a power outage lasting more than 15 minutes?

The Shire President advised that, on behalf of Council, she has been advocating to anybody that will listen, including WALGA on telecommunications and improved connectivity, not just during emergency events but every day in the Perth hills. WALGA had a roundtable to address this. There is also a Federal review in telecommunications that has commenced and former Minister Alannah MacTiernan is heading up that review. The Shire President has also had recent meetings with Tanya Lawrence and also Linda Reynolds and discussed telecommunications. In the near future there will be an opportunity for some community input on that. It is front and centre of the Shire's advocacy at the moment and definitely highlighted through the recent Parkerville bushfire and the super-cell storm event on 16 January. The Shire President also advised that when possible she is advocating on behalf of the Shire of Mundaring and also other peri-urban and regional areas where telecommunication connectivity needs enhancing.

2. Acknowledging that two
Parkerville bushfires were
started by overhead power lines,
will the Shire of Mundaring set a
goal of putting overhead power
lines underground, perhaps over
30 or more years to alleviate the
cost?

The Chief Executive Officer advised that the new Western Power targeted underground power program excludes the hills areas due to the prohibitive cost of trenching and drilling. Due to the cost prohibitive nature of this work unfortunately there is no ability for the Shire of Mundaring to fund this out of its own revenue.

5. Maraiah Magson – Stoneville

- 1. Regarding the logistics of rolling out the FOGO program:
 - What are the costs for the Shire to maintain our general waste services and have our green waste

The Chief Executive Officer advised:

- The costs are based on a per lift rate, in accordance with the Regional Waste Agreements.
- The total cost of waste services is recovered in the waste charge and associated waste fees for discretionary additional services;

- collection services as fortnightly?;
- Does the cost for maintaining the current waste program, including FOGO, equate to the portion of rates revenue associated?; and
- 3. What are the environmental implications of taking our old bins away to "recycle" them?
- 3) The only bins proposed to be replaced are the tall thin 140L bins to the short wide 140 L style, which to date has been on an as required basis. As red lids get rolled out the 140 L skinny bin will be replaced. Those in sound condition will be reused.

6. John Doncon – Mundaring Sporting Club Incorporated

1. With regards to the leased premises upgrades, including the Mundaring Sporting Club, what is the outcome of the assessments within the Shire and is there any short-term developments to take place?

In adopting the 2023/24-2026/27 Corporate Business Plan, Council has determined that Shire leased facilities will now be included for consideration for access upgrades, alongside Shire run facilities. Information is currently being gathered from the lessees regarding their usage, which will help inform future prioritisation of buildings to be considered for access upgrades (noting that Parkerville and Glen Forrest Halls are the current priority for upgrades, with construction contracts awarded with works to commence this financial year.

In addition, Shire recreation facilities that are leased, for example sporting clubs and tennis clubs, are now also being included in the Recreation Facilities Informing Strategy, which is currently in development. That Strategy will consider and prioritise a range of recreation requirements. This Strategy will also be considered by Council later this year.

7. Tom Burbidge – Mundaring Resident & Ratepayer Association

3. Will the Shire create a project for the Railway Reserve Heritage Trail to become a tourist destination, from Gugeri Street to the Industrial area?

The Chief Executive Officer advised there is currently no existing plan, however, the Railway Reserve Heritage Trail is one of many trails that the Shire currently promotes and will continue to promote as part of its tourism marketing strategy.

4. Does the Shire of Mundaring have a vision for the Mundaring Town Centre in 5, 10, 20 and 50 years time?

The Chief Executive Officer advised that yes, the Shire has a strong vision for the Mundaring town centre and has a Mundaring Town Centre Masterplan which was adopted by Council in March 2017. It outlines the vision for the town centre and what will be achieved in the short, medium and long

That the Shire of Mundaring fully compensates Lara Churton-Hughes and her husband Alastair Hughes (of 1560 Woodlands Road, Stoneville) the equivalent amount of annual rates previously paid and any other levies also previously collected for a two (2) year period, being 2021/2022 and 2022/2023, in order to partially compensate those residents for their loss of privacy, loss of amenity and general use and enjoyment of their private property, in favour of allowing the Stoneville VBFB to operate out of their property as a temporary Fire Station in order to continue to serve and protect the local Stoneville and wider communities whilst potentially saving the Shire of Mundaring Ratepayers an estimated \$140,000 plus, over a two (2) year period.

3.2.10 Organisational Improvement

That Council establishes a set of aspirational VALUES in the 2024-25 financial year and that the stated values will provide a destination for organisational improvement.

And:

- 1. That such Council lead values are not just motherhood statements but become lived values that apply at all levels of the Shire;
- 2. That in the establishment of these values staff will not be involved directly or indirectly to avoid the inherent conflicts / perceived conflicts of interest. That Council will directly engage a specialist external consultant to assist them;
- 3. That the values that are established will guide all behaviours, documents and decisions of everyone in the Shire;
- 4. That future Community perception surveys will be designed to include community perceptions of adherence to the values that are exposed by Council;
- 5. That design of future Community Perceptions surveys will be approved by Council prior to issue; and
- 6. Throughout the organisation and at all levels, organisational values will and be a part of the KPI setting and staff review process.

3.2.11 Mundaring Town Centre Development

That in the 2024-25 financial year Council will commission an independent, well credentialed property development consultant to provide options to expedite development of the Town Centre:

- Considerations will be given that such developments might be Shire, debt (Treasury), Grants by patient investors or other solutions that the consultant may suggest;
- 2. The Shire may become owners and landlords of some apartments, commercial tenancies or social amenities in order to underpin construction commencement:
- 3. The underlying principle will be that such developments would need to be cash flow positive to avert an excessive burden on the finances of the Shire and will contribute to the progressive development of the Town Centre; and
- 4. That the consultants report will deliver options and provide a credible, independent report to support Grant or other applications.

3.2.12 De-Politicisation of Environmental Protection Agency

That the Shire of Mundaring (SOM) advise State Government requesting depoliticisation of the Environmental Protection Agency (EPA) such that:

- 1. The EPA becomes entirely eco-scientific, and independent of government control or influence able to report to the Environment Minister but without any direction or requirement from that minister, including no requirement for the minister to provide the EPA with any "Statement of Intent";
- 2. The EPA becomes proactive in actually protecting the environment by requiring comprehensive eco-scientific research and record of all land for the basis of public and mutual consultation by development proponents and all other sectors of the community; and
- 3. The EPA makes the independent eco-scientific information from proactive land research and analysis the basis of adjudication of a matter brought to the attention of the EPA, in place of the current adjudication process made on the basis of information provided by competing vested interests, which is usually not comprehensive and objective and therefore cannot be relied upon to be eco scientific.

This communication to State Government is to be made in a letter composed in collaboration with Friends of Council Mundaring, Nannas for Native Forests Perth Hills, and Friends of the Northern Jarrah Forests (and any other local, relevant, interested parties), with information attachments approved by WA Forest Alliance and other relevant environmental non-government organisations.

3.2.13 Hyperspectral Survey Policy

- 1. Supports the future implementation of Hyperspectral Survey across the Shire of Mundaring;
- 2. Resolves to collaborate with the community and other Shires toward obtaining a Hyperspectral Survey of all shires within the Northern Jarrah Forest Belt;
- 3. To proactively inform all Council planning and land management with accurate updated land and people information; and
- 4. Including informing eco planning and development which meet the criteria for obtaining UNESCO listing of the Northern Jarrah Forest Belt, as a World Biosphere and World Heritage Centre.

- 3. Support networking of those shires to mutually obtain Hyperspectral Surveillance as a means of collecting geo-bio data across the entirety of the Northern Jarrah Forests; and
- 4. Set up of an umbrella "Friends of the Northern Jarrah Forests WA" for:
 - the coordination of all 'Friends of the Northern Jarrah Forests', with a friends group in each shire; and
 - the coordination of a "Scientists for the Northern Jarrah Forests Advisory Group", probably under the auspices of WAFA (WA Forest
