Jamie O'Neill said that he had recently been involved with a successful joint exercise with Wooroloo Prison Farm and Accacia, also attending a regional exercise which included the Darling Range ICV on 14 September 2017.

Craig Cuthbert said that the Shires Fire Hazard Inspection Officers and fire Protection Officers continue to work closely with the Chief Bush Fire Control Officer and bridges in preparation for the upcoming season.

6.3 OEM REPORT

Merveen Cross spoke to the following report:

DFES Fire Chat (Replaces "Are You Ready Champagne")

This bushfire season Fire Chat will be the new 'branding umbrella' for community engagement and communications around bushfire. This will be supported by the Are You Ready Campaign. Fire Chat replaces DFES previous bushfire communications known as Prepare. Act. Survive. A suite of new bushfire planning and preparation tools have been developed, consisting of 5 minute Fire Chat, and supported by Your Bushfire Preparation Toolkit, which are two simple steps aimed at helping residents to be better prepared for bushfire. The 5 minute Fire Chat asks people living in a high bushfire risk area to have a fire chat to discuss three key questions with family and friends or to discuss with their neighbours if they live alone:

- When will you know to leave?
- Where will you go?
- Which way will you go?

If this is all people do, they will be more prepared than doing nothing. This approach is easy for all people to achieve. After people have answered the three questions above, they are then asked a disruptive and thought-provoking question: That's a great first step to protect your family. However have you considered what you would do if you are at work when a fire threatens? The intent of this question is to drive them to the take the next step, which is to seek out their Bushfire Preparation Toolkit. The Toolkit is available in hard copy but can also be downloaded at www.dfes.wa.gov.au/firechat.

Fact Sheets with further bushfire preparedness information can also be found on the website. All existing publications of Prepare. Act. Survive and supporting publications should be disposed of as Fire Chat and Your Bushfire Preparation Toolkit will replace this publication. Westplans

Rationalisation of the Westplans

Work on Phase 7

Westplan Rationalisation is underway. This phase involves transforming all Westplans into State Hazard Plans and making them annexes to the overarching State EM Plan. The new State Hazard Plan template is near completion and will be circulated to stakeholders soon.

Westplans for similar hazards will be combined into a single State Hazard Plan during this phase. A workshop has been held to progress amalgamation of the four 'crash' related Westplans (air crash, road crash, PTA rail crash and Brookfield rail crash).

The Department of Fire and Emergency Services (DFES) has also been progressing the amalgamation of Westplans for the hazards of flood, cyclone and storm, as well as earthquake and collapse. Phase 7 is expected to be completed by December 2017.

Risk Assessment Reports

A risk assessment report has been produced for each of the Emergency Management districts in the state. These reports detail the results of the district risk assessments that were conducted as part of the State Risk Project.

Each report explains the risks posed to the district from a range of priority hazards. A credible worst-case scenario for each hazard was assessed in a workshop setting to determine the risks. Participants assessed how the hazards may impact upon the district's economy, its people, public administration, the environment and the social setting. These five key areas are part of the State Core Objectives.

The collective district data represents the culmination of three years of extensive collaboration that has included input from 406 individuals from 119 separate agencies. The State Risk Project has identified the district level as the best avenue for practically assessing risk, developing treatments and measuring capability. These reports provide a body of evidence that shows how emergencies will likely

affect us. This will then inform mitigation options and expenditure priorities to build a more resilient state.

10th Australasian Natural Hazards Management Conference (ANHMC)

The conference will be hosted by the Office of Emergency Management and will take place from 30 October to 3 November 2017. This year's conference will provide a forum for discussion of the integration of hazard information into effective emergency risk management. Applying science and research information to best practice planning, warning, response and recovery capabilities will lower the impact of events on communities. The conference will bring together expertise from Australia, New Zealand and abroad to enable the sharing of knowledge and strengthen collaboration. The target audience of the conference is: emergency managers, planners, risk assessors, asset and utility managers, natural hazard researchers and scientists.

WA Police - Recovery Communications Project

The SEMC Public Information Reference Group (PIRG) wrote to local governments requesting feedback in relation to how local governments would benefit from having access at a state level in relation to the planning and delivery of recovery related public information activities during the recovery phase of an emergency.

WA Police were successful in receiving funding through the National Disaster Resilience Program (NDRP) administered by the Federal Attorney-General's Department and the WA Office of Emergency Management. A highly experienced EM professional, Sharna Sumpton, has been engaged to work on this initiative with WA Police. The agency is excited about the potential benefits this initiative will have for Local Governments in the future.

Sharna Sumpton will be liaising with local governments and relevant key stakeholders over the coming months to develop strategies and recommendations for PIRG to implement. Should you have any queries regarding this project please contact WA Police on 9222 1538.

Memorandum of Understanding (MOU)

The Metropolitan South District Emergency Management Committee have been working on a draft MOU between all local governments in the south district including surrounding shires of Serpentine Jarrahdale and Boddington. The MOU will provide the opportunity to share resources through response and recovery. There is the possibility that the MOU could be progressed to the East, Central and North metropolitan DEMCs at a later date.

A Emergency Risk Management Local Government Handbook

The handbook is intended specifically for use by local governments around the State to facilitate risk management and to develop emergency management plans. Local governments are encouraged to view the handbook on OEMs website.

New Bushfire Subcommittee Up and Running

An additional subcommittee now operates within the State Emergency Management Committee (SEMC) framework

The Creation of a State Bushfire Coordinating Committee (SBCC) was a direct recommendation from Mr Euan Ferguson's Report of the Special Inquiry into the January 2016 Waroona Fire to assist in enhancing the management of rural fire within Western Australia.

The SBCC was formed in early 2017 following approval by the SEMC in December 2016 of an initial terms of reference and proposed membership

The SBCC met twice in the first half of 2017, Mr Murray Carter Director Office of Bushfire Risk Management, was appointed inaugural Chair, with the formation membership comprising:

A significant early achievement of the committee has been reaching agreement on an overarching mechanism to prioritise distribution of bushfire risk mitigation grant expenditures, inclusive of a proposed governance structure to ensure transparency and criteria to guide decision making.

A considerable proportion of the committee's effort is being placed into the formulation of a State Bushfire Management Policy. This important initiative is currently in the early scoping stages and considerable collaboration will be undertaken with a wide range of affected and interested parties as the policy development progresses.

GENERAL BUSINESS

Craig Garrett spoke to the following:

- The State Bush Fire Exercise will be held on 17 October 2017.
- DFES staff attended a live fire drill at Acacia Prison, also involving Wooroloo staff and fire appliances. A visit of the site will be organised shortly to familiarise on-call DFES staff, prior to the fire season.
- DFES have launched a new community engagement initiative, Fire Chat which replaces the Prepare Act Survive program. The Fire Chat will still be supported by the Are You Ready campaign, but will provide a series of short questions to guide the public into planning for fires and a range of tools to assist. Details are available on the DFES website. The Are You Ready campaign will be launched this Sunday 1 October 2017.
- The Pre-season Volunteer Fire Fighter forum to be held by DFES at Joondalup on 4 November 2017.
- The UCL/UMR mitigation works to commence shortly on crown land, in the NE Region.
- An ICV exercise was conducted on 26 August 2017 involving all metro ICV's at the DFES Academy, including the Mundaring Darling Range BFB.
- A Rural Urban Interface(RUI) exercise will be conducted in Mundaring on the 21 October 2017, involving BFB's and DFES VFRS volunteers.
- A DFES Metro "Exercise Kaala" will be held on 11 October 2017 involving fire agencies, invited LG's and other lifeline stakeholders, focussing on recovery following a major incident.
- The Volunteer Bush Fire Games was held on 23 September 2017 involving a number of BFB's including Parkerville BFB, from Shire of Mundaring.

Ryan Hamblion advised that a training exercise will be held in November with the date and details to be advised in due course.

Nick Stewart said that St John Ambulance had recently attend several exercises and spoke about ambulance evacuation in an emergency. A discussion was held in regards to aged care and the time/resources that would be required to evacuate in an emergency.

Mark Luzi told the meeting that the Shire's Fire Hazard Inspection Officers will soon commence annual Firebreak inspections, with the Shires Fire Protection Officer currently conduction hazard reduction burns when weather conditions permit. Test Your Bush Fire Plan will be held in November

Craig Cuthbert advised that a variable message board has been hired for the month of October and will be located on selected arterial roads within the Shire, providing residents with fire preparedness messages.

Craig Cuthbert said that Fire Hazard Inspection Officers and Emergency Management staff will attend the Rotary Markets and Darlington Arts Festival in November promoting Bush Fire Preparedness and DFES Fire Chat.
